May 13, 2023 Deborah Silver - Weaving

Deborah Silver is a native of Cleveland, Ohio. She discovered her love of weaving while attending the Cleveland Institute of Art, attaining a BFA as a Fiber major and Drawing minor.

After a weaving internship, Deborah learned the craft of antique furniture upholstery. She then combined her skills to open her own fiber art business. She worked closely with interior designers, creating site-specific fiber commissions for private residences, businesses, and religious institutions.

Currently, Deborah designs and weaves pieces using the split-shed technique, transforming traditional patterns into a signature method of hand-weaving. All weft yarns travel from selvedge to selvedge, differentiating this cloth from tapestry. Her work is inspired by the increased cross-culturalism in the world which has been facilitated by technology, the ancient realm of road and trade, now advanced to hyper-speed.

Deborah's weavings have been shown in numerous local and national juried exhibitions. In 2015, she received a Cleveland Jewish Arts and Culture Fellowship award. In 2017, she received third prize in the ARTneo national juried competition. She received the Complex Weavers Award and First Place at Complexity 2018. Deborah is also the recipient of a 2019 Ohio Arts Council Individual Excellence Award.

Deborah teaches split-shed weaving workshops internationally. In 2019, she published <u>The</u> <u>Technique of Split-shed Weaving</u>, a book that illustrates pictorial weaving using the splitshed process on four-shaft looms. Her articles have been published in Complex Weavers magazine.

Deborah Silver will give a PowerPoint lecture including an explanation of the split-shed weaving process, how to form a split shed on different loom types, and the myriad structures that can be created using a split shed on just four shafts. Deborah will also show examples of her woven art and discuss her creative process. In addition, she will bring dozens of woven samples for attendees to peruse.

June 10, 2023 Cindy Grisdela – Art Quilting

Cindy Grisdela, from Reston, VA, is an award-winning fiber artist with over 30 years' experience creating eye-catching quilts. She specializes in Improv piecing and design and using color fearlessly in your quilts.

Cindy has been teaching and lecturing in person since 2014 and online since April 2020. Her classes use Improv techniques to engage student creativity and encourage making original quilts without patterns or templates. There's no way to make a mistake!

She comes from a long line of women who have expressed themselves using a needle and thread, although curiously there weren't any quilters in her family. Creating with various forms of fabric and thread has been a part of her life since childhood, and she is self-taught as a fiber artist, with lots of experimentation along the way.

Cindy is the author of *Artful Improv* and a new book, *Adventures in Improv Quilts*. She appeared on The Quilt Show with Alex Anderson and Ricky Tims in 2021 with segments on Improv blocks and curves.

Have you ever wondered how to create an Improv Quilt without a pattern? Where do you start? How do you know when it's finished? Author and award winning artist Cindy Grisdela will share her tips and tricks in this entertaining lecture about the process for working improvisationally from start to finish.

Extended Workshop: Multiple structures using a straight threading – May 13, 14, and 15, 2023

Deborah Silver

Break out of blocks with split-shed weaving. Weave curves and blend colors using continuous wefts on a 4-shaft loom with no special equipment. In this workshop, students will create multiple combinations of weave structures using only four shafts and a straight threading. Only tie-ups and treadling are changed between samples. Most of these combinations would normally require a minimum of eight shafts. Students will experiment with combinations of twills, summer and winter, double weave, Han damask, taqueté and more! Woven samples include continuous, complementary, and supplementary wefts, as well as wefts which combine to produce shading for pictorial weaving. This is the same color-blending process Deborah Silver uses to create her art. Students will also learn to make a cartoon on cloth that will advance with the warp and will not wrinkle when beating.

Although students will not be able to complete all the samples in class, they will leave with the ability to complete them at home with all the drafts and instructions.



Mini Workshop: Improv Play with Line and Shapes – June 10, 2023 Cindy Grisdela

Learn versatile improv techniques to create improv circles, angled stripes, and inset strips. In addition, we'll talk about choosing color effectively and using simple design principles to create dynamic compositions. Students may choose to create a quilt like the one shown, or they may combine the elements into their own design.

Basic sewing skills and a machine in good working order are necessary. This workshop is best for intermediate to advanced quilters ready to take the next step to creating original designs.

Chateau d'Orquevaux has been the property of The Attias family since 2002. Ziggy Attias, Châtelain since 2016 has made his success as an Artist, Designer, Entrepreneur, Award-Winning filmmaker, and father of three daughters. His days are now spent in the French countryside dedicated to his dream, the residency program of Chateau d'Orquevaux. As Founder, Ziggy took on this project in the hopes of creating a community and home for artists of all mediums, backgrounds, and stages in their journey. The International residency has grown remarkably over the years and has now proudly hosted artists from all over the world. The residency has received applications from over 125 countries.

The intertwined trees contain their names in Hebrew, representing their entwined lives. The fish are one of the oldest Jewish symbols - "The eyes of a fish never closes, representing the watchful eyes of God."

The bride and groom stand under the canopy. It represents the roof of the new home they are creating. The four people supporting the poles represent the community who are responsible for helping the couple become part of the community.




Croatian Needle Lace





Sharing Honors and Burdens: Renwick Invitational 2023

Renwick Gallery, Washington, DC – May 26, 2023 – March 31, 2024



Sharing Honors and Burdens: Renwick Invitational 2023 focuses on fresh and nuanced visions by six Native American or Alaska Native artists who express the honors and burdens that connect people to one another. The more than 50 artworks in the exhibition arise from traditions of making that honor family, community or clan, and require broad community participation. Six artists — Joe Feddersen (Arrow Lakes/Okanagan), Lily Hope (Tlingit), Ursala Hudson (Tlingit), Erica Lord (Athabaskan/Iñupiat), Geo Neptune (Passamaquoddy) and Maggie Thompson (Fond du Lac Ojibwe) — analyze the present moment by evoking historical practices and potential futures. Their works are often culturally specific, yet they communicate across cultural boundaries.
