Final Workshops for May-June 2021

MAY--Extended Workshop May 8, 1:00 to 4:00 PM, May 9 & 10, 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM *Map Haiku with Valerie S. Goodwin*

Get in the zone! Go Zen! Tap into your innermost creative side. Make a beautiful mixed media map of an imaginary place inspired by haiku – a minimalist form of poetry.

Students taking this workshop will create a series of small, simple, and understated art quilt maps that capture the feeling of haiku written by each student during the course of the class. The instructor will guide the student through a structured yet nurturing series of steps that provides opportunities to grow and learn. Although machine stitching in an option, hand stitching is a key part of the workshop.

JUNE--Mini workshop 1 Handspun Wire Core & More with Emily Wohlscheid June 12, 1:00 to 4:00 PM This exploratory, all levels workshop takes students from learning the basics of spinning around a fine wire core to utilizing the same techniques to experiment with core materials that have similar properties. In addition to

spooled jewelry wire, students will have the opportunity to spin around battery operated LED strands and fabric covered floral wire. An emphasis will be placed on how to adjust your wheel for these unusual yarns and how to prepare various core materials for spinning. Valuable tips and tricks to avoid over twisting and wire breakage will be covered for all core materials with suggestions on how to use the finished yarns

Student's Materials Fee: \$18.00 Kit includes 2 fabric-covered floral wire stems, 1 LED wire light strand, 1 40 yd spool of jewelry wire, 1 oz. spinning fibers, 1 fabric band

Student Supply List: a spinning wheel in good working order with all its parts; wire nippers/flush cutters; flat nose pliers (with smooth jaws); round nose pliers

JUNE--Mini Workshop 2 Blending Textures with Emily Wohlscheid June 13, 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM

Are you looking to add some texture to your next spinning or felting project? This workshop is designed for the discerning fiber artist to prep their own textural batts and rolags to suit their needs. An emphasis will be placed on understanding blending equipment and the textural versatility and limitations of cloth types from coarse to fine. The techniques covered will include keeping lock structure intact, utilizing recycled textiles, the best ratios of effect fibers to base fiber, and more!

Student's Materials Fee: \$30 Kit includes 7 oz. of mixed dyed fibers (may have some undyed) including: 2 oz. dyed locks; 2 oz. dyed fleece; 2 oz. dyed top; 1 oz. of mixed textural effect fibers

Student Supply List: a drum carder or blending board (not as ideal, but it will still work great!)

JUNE--Mini Workshop 3 Tweed Blends with Emily Wohlscheid June 13, 2:00 to 5:00 PM

Join me virtually as I demonstrate several variations on creating tweeds on the drum carder! We will explore using color alone as well as textural modifiers to create various degrees of flecked tweedy texture. The course will cover several variations on tweed texture and how color choices affect the finished cloth whether spun to be incorporated into a woven/knit/crochet project or felted.

Student's Materials Fee: \$28 Kit includes 7 oz. of mixed dyed fibers (may have some undyed) including:

3 oz. of top; 3 oz. of fleece; 1 oz. of tweed effect fibers/scraps

Student Supply List: a drum carder and its tools or hand cards (a blending board will work but will not be able to achieve the same effects); scissors or a rotary cutter





In addition to his many classes, John has an exquisite offering in the form of a reference book: *A Field Guide to Japanese Textiles.* This is not your average printed guide, however. Each copy is handmade, individually signed and numbered, contains 120 samples of different textiles with descriptive text and is bound with a gorgeous tooled leather cover. Sigh, it is tempting; something else to add to my fiber wish list.

When Daryl Lancaster starts talking color you know you are going to learn something new about "Color with a capital C" but you are also going to have a great time. Daryl's March presentation was no exception. We started out with a review of the basics. Think value and hue and that ever so wonderful color wheel and then she led us on a bit of a roller coaster ride into the realm of color inspiration.

In her world it's everywhere, from Fashion forecasts to Behr paint (Euphoric Magenta any one?) to palette

generating websites. There were four, no five, no wait, maybe seven sites that can serve up a set of colors based on a photo you upload or a theme you enter. Not to mention the boat load of cell phone Apps that are, now, available to provide color inspiration at your fingertips.

But for those of us who are a little more "hands on" she encouraged us to check out magazines like Real Simple or Woman's Day, and then why not try that most hands-on of hands-on-techniques—*Wraps*. Yes, you heard right. Good Old Fashioned—wind some yarn selections around a folded up index card—Wraps! She makes it look easy (like the wrap that turned into the weaving in the photo) but what could be more fun, not to



mention gloriously tactile, than having a color combo come to life in a few (or more) twirls around a card. And if it doesn't look quite right—hey I can unwrap it and try it again!





From the Librarian

Spring is here, and I'm planning a wool sweater. Yes, I know my timing is a little off. Still, I've decided to knit a gansey (a type of fisherman's sweater, characterized by panels of knit/purl patterns), so while I was picking up library books last weekend; I searched for a couple to check out myself. Here are a few useful ones I found:

First Choices

FISHERMEN'S SWEATERS

PROGRAM SUPROGRAM

ALICE STARMORE

Fishermen's Sweaters by Alice Starmore. This book has a theme of sea travel, with sweaters named after various ports - mostly English, Scottish and Irish place names. The sweaters are lovely, mostly solid colors with complex knit/purl patterns and cables. The final section of the book, which reaches out to other European and American fishing ports, does include some colorwork. Although several of the sweaters really appeal to me, Alice Starmore does have a reputation for denser knitting than most people are able to achieve, which scares me, so on to:

Classic British Knits by Madeline Weston. Subtitled "40 Traditional Patterns from England, Scotland and Ireland", this book


includes sections for Gansey, Fair Isle, Aran, and Shetland Lace sweaters. Published in 1986, some of the colors are a bit eye-watering (bright gold and royal blue Aran sweaters, anyone?), but the patterns themselves are interesting. Some are very traditional and some have more unusual construction, such as a gansey with horizontal cables in one panel. Patterns are available for cotton and silk yarns are included, as well as wool in various sizes. If I had done my research before visiting the library, and checked our online catalog, I would have also picked up these two books, which I've heard very good things about from gansey knitters:



Second Thoughts

Patterns for Guernseys, Jerseys, and Arans by Gladys Thompson. This is a book of historical sweater

patterns, with descriptions of the stitches used and information from the people who provided the author with the patterns. It is not a detailed pattern book - probably not the best starting place for a beginner, but it has a wealth of information on traditional fishermen's sweaters, and Knitting from the Netherlands: Traditional Dutch Fishermen's Sweaters by Henriette van der Klift-Tellegen. This one contains 40 historic sweater designs and vintage photographs of the Dutch





fishermen and boys who wore them. I haven't looked at this book yet, but have heard it's interesting.

But Then Again

The book that I will probably end up using most is one that I own, but the library doesn't - and I think it should. It's Beth Brown-Reinsel's book, **Knitting Ganseys**. Now available in an updated and revised version, this is the go-to book for learning how to construct ganseys. The author walks through the construction of a complete sweater, with instructions for completing a mini-gansey to help with understanding all the components of a full-sized sweater. Several attractive patterns for sweaters are included, in both traditional sport-weight gansey yarn and in heavier Aran-weight yarn.



This brings me to a question for all of you - I think we have a lot more knitters than is obvious from the library. Are there other knitting books that you think are must-haves for the well-stocked library? Any books you really wish you could borrow? 
Inclement Weather Policy for In-person Meetings

This image is a detail of an image of Mars taken by the Mars Odyssey orbiter. Called *Blue Dunes on the Red Planet*, the NASA webpage describes it this way: "A sea of dark dunes, sculpted by the wind into long lines, surrounds Mars' northern polar cap and covers an area as big as Texas. In this false-color image, areas with cooler temperatures are recorded in bluer tints, while warmer features are depicted in yellows and oranges. Thus, the dark, sun-warmed dunes glow with a golden color. This image covers an area 19 miles (30 kilometers) wide."
